The Problem Incoming Freshmen and Transfer Student

- 1. Lack of good study skills
- 2. Do not regularly:
 - Review notes
 - Ask questions
- 3. Study "just" before the test (PANIC)
- 4. Don't write in complete sentences



The Fix: Quickwrites (WAC)

- 1. Forces students to review notes regularly
- 2. Forces students to think about questions
- 3. Forces students to use good writing skills

The Quickwrite (writing across the Curriculum – WAC)

- Brief written response on assigned topic
- May be given at the beginning and end or after class (homework)
- Focuses the students
- Helps evaluate student and teacher
- Promotes good writing and critical thinking skills



My Quickwrite

- Homework done outside of class
 - Allows ample time to review and improve notes and identify important concepts and questions
 - Allows individual questions to be answered individually
- 2. Done regularly (7-10 days)-forced review
- 3. Typed 1 page, double spaced required student to do outside of class due at the beginning of class
- 4. Up to one third can be questions



The Requirements

- One page double spaced typed
- Briefly discuss the important concepts covered since last quickwrite (include labs)
- 3. Use up to one-third of paper for questions must certify
- Ten quickwrites per term 100 points (10 points each)
- 5. Due every 7 10 days (syllabus) 10% off for each day late



The Results

- Students regularly review notes and asked questions
- 2. Both students and professor got a good indication of how well they were doing
- Students felt it better prepared them for tests.
- 4. More effective with new students
- 5. Gained experience in writing improvement



Conclusions

- Helps students to help themselves. (develops learning, writing and critical thinking skills)
- 2. More effective with incoming students
- Modified system allows more time for teaching
